Ten Collier County charities selected for 2014 Outreach Grant consideration

The Outreach Commission has met and selected ten charities to be interviewed for 2014 grants. All are 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations serving Collier County residents and meet the Commission's mission statement to "seek out those charities in Collier County where the basic needs are requested." The Agencies and their descriptions of services are as follows:

- 1. Angels Under Cover of Collier Co., Inc. provides underwear, socks and school uniforms to economically needy elementary school students who would otherwise come to school inadequately dressed.
- 2. Baby Basics of Collier County supports hard-working parents needing diapers for their babies. The organization currently serves about 300 babies at eight distribution sites and, since 1994, has distributed over 1.5 million diapers to families in the area.
- 3. Habitat for Humanity of Collier Co. brings people together to build homes, communities and hope, with the ultimate goal of putting shelter on the hearts and minds of people in such a powerful way that poverty housing and homelessness becomes socially, politically and religiously unacceptable in our nation and world.
- 4. Harry Chapin Food Bank of SW FL, Inc. works to overcome hunger in Charlotte, Collier, Glades, Hendry and Lee Counties through education and by cooperatively working with affiliated agencies in the procuring and distributing of food, equitably and without discrimination.
- 5. Immokalee Child Care Center serves the Immokalee community by providing exceptional educational programs and highest quality childcare. Parents and staff work together to promote family-focused events and parent education activities, which provide a beneficial experience for the child, and encourage cooperation and communication between the family and the Center.

- 6. Laces of Love Charitable Foundation, Inc. has a goal to provide NEW shoes (preferably sneakers) to low income and disadvantaged children in Collier and Lee Counties, and to educate the public on the needs of these children.
- 7. Literacy Volunteers of Collier Co. enhances the lives of students and their families by teaching them literacy skills via one-on-one tutoring, small group classes, interactive English language learning laboratory and family literacy programs, as well as literacy programs for the workplace, organizations and citizenship preparation classes.
- 8. NAMI of Collier County

(National Alliance for Mental Illness) provides education, support and advocacy to improve the quality of life for those affected by serious and persistent mental illness so they can recover and lead productive, meaningful lives. They also provide financial assistance for psychiatric evaluations, emergency prescriptions, shelter, food and a drop-in center for individuals diagnosed with mental illness.

9. St. Matthew's House

changes lives in a spiritual environment that is both compassionate and disciplined, as well as providing housing for the homeless and food for the needy. Among the many structured programs for residents are those for prevention and recovery.

10. The Salvation Army, Naples Corps serves our community year-round. Men, women, children and families are helped through social services with emergency financial assistance, food and child care.

Our web-site improvements include a Church Theme site installed by a web designer. Church Themes develop contemporary web themes and designs expressly for churches, providing ongoing updates and support. The design and pagination used on St. John's website is similar to the most current web designs.

- Responsive: Whatever device you view our website on, be it smart phone, tablet or computer, the site automatically adjusts to the device. Ease of accessing our site has greatly increased now, and with more people using smart phones to search for churches, it's a big step in the right direction.
- **Picture Rich:** You'll notice the pictures are wider and more colorful due to increased pixels and use of light box technology. The pictures can be viewed singularly or in carousel mode, creating a more engaging site. There are also plenty of videos!
- Identification: The top and bottom of each page (Header & Footer) have been specifically designed to highlight our church name, address, phone number, contact link, directions and service times. We want to make it easy for people to find St. John's.
- New Stuff: The entire site has been completely updated over this summer, but some new additions include the "Celebrate Tab" featuring "In the News," "A Devoted Life," "Your Story," "Worship" and "Giving." I've also included "Online Learning" that highlights links for youth and adults. Sermons will have the standard audio link and we are adding podcast and video features.



Ben is Benjamin Kwashi, Archbishop of Jos, Nigeria. He is one of the most well respected leaders of the Anglican Communion, and known to a number of us at St. John's, as he visited our diocese and preached from our pulpit a number of years ago.

Gloria is his wife and presently the energy behind a ministry to save, feed and educate the hundreds of children orphaned in the past four years by Boko Haran, the terrorist murderous Muslim group finally being noticed by the press after their kidnapping of nearly 300 young, mostly Christian girls.

The Archbishop and his wife have miraculously survived several terrorist attacks themselves, the last of which left Gloria temporarily blind for six months.

Please pray for the Archbishop and Gloria, and the orphans being cared for by them as well as other Christian ministries in Nigeria.

Vestry nominee qualifications include that the nominee:

- Is a communicant in good standing at St. John's.
- Is 18 Years or older.
- Demonstrates commitment to Christian tenets through regular worship attendance, Bible study, a witness of God's love to family and friends, makes recorded contributions to St. John's and affirms our Bylaws, Mission Statement and Core beliefs.
- Will commit to completing their threeyear term, consistently attend Vestry meetings and special gatherings, provide parish leadership as needed and strive toward tithe of time, talent and treasure.

Vestry members are important lay leaders for any church, exercising a holy calling that powerfully touches the lives of many people. It's important to get someone's permission before you nominate them for Vestry. We have two openings this year.

The Nominating Committee plays a critical role in the Vestry nomination process:

- The Committee shall be comprised of two Vestry members and three Congregational members.
- They shall nominate members of the Congregation for the Vestry.
- They shall deliver their report to the Secretary in sufficient time for inclusion in the notice of election.

We need St. John's members who are willing to serve on the Nominating Committee as well as stand for election to the Vestry. God may be calling you to step forward and serve at this time. I ask you to prayerfully consider these opportunities, and if the Holy Spirit is stirring your heart, please talk to Fr. Joe or call the church office at 261-2355.

It's an exciting time to be in leadership at St. John's as we continue to experience numerical, spiritual and relational growth. Please keep this important process in your prayers over the coming days and God Bless You! □

St. John's Architects ... designers of our spiritual home

As we reach the conclusion of our three-phase remodeling project, it's timely to look back at the men who designed our par-

ish's buildings.

Walter "Walt" L. Keller, AIA (1931-2001), a native of Illinois, was one of Naples' foremost architects during the 70s and 80s. His offices were on the second floor of a retail shop on Third Street South. He positioned his drafting table by the window to capture good, natural lighting. Shoppers could frequently look up and see Walt at work.

In 1970, Walt was contracted to design and oversee the construction of our Sanctuary building that was built and dedicated in 1971.

In 1978, Walt completed plans for our Parish Hall with groundbreaking in 1979 and dedication in 1981.

Some of his other projects included The Village on Venetian Bay, The Plaza on Third Street S., Neapolitan Way Shopping Center and the Naples Bath & Tennis Club.

Walt served as president of the Greater Naples Chamber of Commerce and chair of the Naples Board of Appeals among many other civic endeavors.

Robert "Bob" E. Forsythe, AIA (1924-2014), a native of Ohio, designed our Brewster Hall building in 1986. Ground was broken in 1987 and dedication took place in 1988.

He left his mark on Naples in other special ways, too ... the Naples Philharmonic (now Artis-Naples), Naples Depot and the former Naples Daily News buildings. In Ft. Myers, he designed the Barbara B. Mann Performing Arts Hall.

Bob served on many civic boards and as president of the North Naples Rotary and the Collier County YMCA.

St. John's is blessed to have had two such upstanding, talented architects create our Spiritual Home in Naples.

A tale of two cities, two churches and one little boy named Luis

I was blind but now I see! John 9:25 (NIV)

It is Thursday evening and people are gathering for worship in a new place. There are children and mothers, all dressed in Sunday best and one or two men, also in their Sunday best.

There are not enough chairs for everyone to sit.
Books are passed out —
Books of Common Prayer. It is a familiar place in a foreign land.

Everyone is happy and very friendly. One of us does not speak their language at all. Most of them do not speak our language.

The opening hymn has a familiar tune. Service begins. It is a joyous occasion. The Padre comes to his sermon, which seems to be a bit long for three or four of the children sitting in the front row.

Two were sharing a seat, squirming a little. One, a boy, had his prayer book open as if he was reading it. In the next moment, he turned his head toward me and looked at me. He was profoundly cross—eyed ... so cross-eyed that I gasped for him. I guessed he had been virtually blind his entire life as a result of this condition. He broke my heart.

The worship service continued, but I could think of nothing but this boy. I wondered where his parents were. I wondered if we could pray for him.

As the service concluded, people were talking and laughing; some were staying and many were leaving. The little boy was nowhere to be seen. I asked a leader, who could not speak my language well, if he knew the boy and if he could be brought back to church.

It amazed me that the boy and his mother were found and brought back. And we prayed for him. I half expected a miracle then. Jesus has healed the blind and His followers have, too. But at the end of prayers, I could see no difference in his eyes.

No words were spoken between us. No words were spoken with his mother.

We departed that land the next day. A word about the boy was exchanged. Can we help him? The church leader's answer was yes.

Since that day, over the course of a few weeks, the boy was brought to the nearest city with facilities. For them it was a six-hour journey ... round trip. He was given a diagnosis which was reviewed



by us and determined to possibly be treatable with glasses and, if necessary, a surgery could be performed.

Upon hearing this news, men here, in earnest prayer and with instant love, delivered the money needed for the glasses and more.

Pictures tell the rest of the story better than words. The little cross-eyed boy was blind, and now he sees.

Two churches, two people with no earthly connection - brought together by God, in God's time — each wondering at times why — and given the reason in the joy of witnessing signs and wonders of God's glory and grace when His people fall in love as He divined from before time eternal.

Thank God for Espiritu Consolador. Thank God for St. John's. Thank God for Luis. Thank God for His abundance and His glory!
