

•God's vision for us seven years ago: "The Lord inspired them to rebuild his house."



- •Debt Free: This was one of my goals from the start. No Assistant Rector for approximately seven years and streamlining staff and budget resulted in \$823,500 in savings. Through generous giving and wise stewardship, reserves have been replenished to meet future needs. ❖

Bea Reid celebrates 100th birthday

Family members and friends gathered at Bea Reid's home in Arbor Trace to help her celebrate her 100th birthday on January 6.

A long-time member of St. John's, Bea is a native of Bath, England and one of eight children — all born into the Church of England. She married David Reid in 1935 and moved to Chelmsford, Essex, a suburb of London, where they survived many German Air Raids during World War II.

Two daughters, Pauline and Pamela (now deceased) were born in England. In 1954, the family moved to the U.S.A., became citizens and lived in Philadelphia where David was C.E.O. of the Weidemann Manufacturing Corporation. Son Colin was born in Doylestown, PA.

David passed away in 1979 and Bea moved to Naples in 1989, joining St. John's. She was a Thrift Shoppe volunteer for many years and led production of marmalade-making for the parish. A talented artist, her home is decorated with many landscape paintings in oils and watercolors (many of English scenes).

Holocaust Museum thought-provoking for St. John's Spirit Alive participants

The first Spirit Alive event for the 2015 season was a trip to the Holocaust Museum of Southwest Florida on Thursday, January 22. A group of twenty-eight met at the museum to recall and further their knowledge of the events leading up to the actual Holocaust and the aftermath. Mr. Sy Stadtmauer, our group leader, gave us valuable insights and facts during that period of history and his insights and details proved to be very enlightening to the historical, emotional, and political events during that dark period of world history. One most interesting concept was how personal friends to the world leaders watched the persecution of Jews and did nothing to help. His presentation was interesting and thought- provoking as we reflect on the world today.

Following lunch, we had a touching presentation by Holocaust survivor, Sabine VanDam. She told us how things changed very slowly after the Nazis took over. They first took away their cars, then their bikes, then the radios, etc. She spoke of her family's flight from the Nazis in Germany, through Denmark to Belgium, before they were captured. She spoke of her fear and hardships and her father's desire to save the family. Her presentation ranged from funny to sad, but there was always their will to survive. She was entertaining and moving.

One wonders how we would have reacted to the events that lead to the Holocaust, or if we would have been victims of the Holocaust. It was a stimulating two hours, and I would recommend to others a trip to the museum. \Box

Words from the Senior Warden



In December, Father Joe preached a sermon about the Holy Spirit. During his address, Father Joe spoke about the need for us to consider the Holy Spirit as a friend, someone we can talk to, a powerful entity that can and will listen to our prayers, a healer.

I am used to praying to God and our Lord Jesus Christ, but, I must admit, I sort of leave the Holy Spirit out of my prayers. Father Joe's sermon gave me pause to think about the Holy Spirit in my life. I can think of two distinct occasions when I have felt the Spirit's presence. I wrote about one of them in an earlier Senior Warden article in our parish newsletter. It had to do with my mother who was going through surgery and the Spirit told me she was going to be all right....not that she would necessarily live. but that she was going to be fine It was a powerful moment. The second time was when I was recovering from eye surgery and I felt the Spirit's hand covering the injured eve in a most extraordinary healing way while I slept. Yes, it might have been my own hand, but what if it wasn't? I would rather believe it was the Holy Spirit and I am sticking to my guns.

Anyway, subsequent to the sermon, I began to think more about the Holy Spirit in other ways. I have been going to church my entire life. There was always a "something" that drew me to attending church and, especially, the Eucharist. So, for me the Holy Spirit was a magnet, knowing that I needed something to draw me to be in the presence of other Christians celebrating God and Jesus. The Holy Spirit just kind of sat in the background waiting for me to realize how important that He was, too.


