Vestry Retreat Produces 2019 Goals

Every fall, the St. John's Vestry holds a retreat to assess our progress over the past year, using a Mutual Ministry Review (MMR) process recommended by the diocese. This year the Vestry met on Saturday, October 27. After celebrating Morning Prayer in the prayer garden, we "retreated" to Sugden to discuss where we see St. John's today and where we want to lead St. John's into the future. We focused on our strengths and opportunities. We drafted the following goals for 2019:

- Develop a professional marketing strategy with help from outside consultant.
- Revamp our website, print "business" cards, bookmarks. Showcase our strengths/our distinctive identity.
- Sacramental, catholic, charismatic, evangelical, Holy Spirit-driven.
- Leader in healing ministries, Biblical teaching, community outreach, Christian partnerships.

INVITE AND EMBRACE NEW MEMBERS INTO THE ST. JOHN'S FAMILY

- Personally invite friends, neighbors, and persons who participate in programs hosted by St. John's (10-step programs, OSL, Bible Studies).
- Deepen relationships with affiliated partners (Outreach grant agencies, YMCA, Children's Evangelistic Fellowship, Christian Healing Center).
- Promote engagement in St. John's various lay ministries.
- Organize Sunday School and regular gatherings for youth and families.
- Launch/host new programs or ministries to address spiritual needs within the parish: e.g., a caregivers' support group, Life Relaunch Retreats.

EXPLORE REPLICATING OUR SUCCESS IN SURROUNDING COMMUNITIES

- Invite an experienced church planner/planter to educate us on successful approaches to planting new churches.
- Develop a long-term plan for planting a new church or materially supporting a start-up church that shares our values and seeks to replicate our strengths.

The Vestry takes responsibility for furthering these goals. But everyone in our parish family is encouraged to work with us through existing ministries or developing new ones.

- Will you personally invite your neighbors and friends to a worship service or parish event?
- Will you extend a warm welcome to visitors and new members?
- Will you take an active part in one or more lay ministries or Bible studies?

While our parish demographic is largely 50+ adults, we treasure the children in our parish family and in our community.

- Will you offer to help teach our primary and preschool children on Sunday mornings?
- Will you participate in upcoming family events and get to know our amazing youth?
- Will you help spread the gospel to elementary school children through our Good News Club at Gulf Coast Charter (12 weeks starting mid-January)?




St. John's Shoppe – An Upscale Thrift A Christmas Note

Update on "Emmanuel" in Aleppo.

October 2018

A woman of great courage -As told in her own words Translated by Andre J Codouni

The brethren have been like a sweet balm to my life and my soul.

I am a widow. I am from Aleppo. I have two sons; one of them got married and moved away to his new home, my other son went to serve in the army. Since the passing of my husband I have lived a solitary life: sometimes with a deadly feeling of loneliness. I will always be thankful that I was invited to join the community Emmanuel at a time of war and turmoil in my city. The brethren have been like a sweet balm to my life and my soul. Before that, I had been in a prayer group for twenty years. After I joined Emmanuel I felt that my understanding of spiritual things deeply widened and developed.

A test of faith and God's sense of humor

One day I was invited to go away on a three-day retreat with Emmanuel. Because of travel and accommodations, the retreat would cost as much as what I would spend the whole month. At the time, I barely survived from one month to the next.

"Emmanuel" in Aleppo

As I thought about whether I should go, I considered this situation as an invitation, where my faith would be tested to either give in to my fears inspired to me by the devil, or courageously take the step of attending this important retreat. Because of the great benefit I saw in that retreat, I said to myself "I want to go, and I have faith that God will provide". Two days after that, in the church where I volunteered, the pastor decided to give a group of ladies and myself a monetary gift on the occasion of Mothers' day. That gift was substantial enough to pay for the retreat and for expenses for the remainder of the month. I was overjoyed. It felt like I received an extra bonus money as a gift from my Father in heaven. When I got to the retreat, it was introduced to everyone present as entitled "Abraham in the Bible and how God provides". God's sense of humor.

God 's protection to me and my family.

In my life after I joined community I have learned to accept personal change as a "sweet anointing on the head, sweeter than a honeycomb" and I continuously thank God for that. The support I received from the brethren was very important for me to carry on and to experience God's protection. Here are only a few examples of God's action in my family's life: When my younger son had been in the Army five years, serving in Aleppo and waiting to be released when the war subsided, I counted fifty times when

he was protected from harm and even death. I clearly believed this was due to the many prayers of the brothers and sisters. One time, the ceiling in the room where my son happened to be, was destroyed with a projectile that exploded; my son was covered with debris and still came out of the room without a scratch. Another time, while on duty, he was standing guard and moved slightly from his guard position to get something from across the street. At that moment a mortar fell and exploded where he was standing a moment ago. He was left unharmed. Many other countless ways God protected me and my relatives. It was not only physical protection but also a spiritual one to cover us all.

"Where is your God, this Jesus, where is he now"?

One day, my son went to his army officer and asked for permission to take a couple of days off to come visit me at home. His officer bluntly refused his request, humiliated him and hit him for no good reason. My son then hit back at his officer, disobeyed his order and left to come home, thus deserting and fleeing his military unit.

I was pleasantly surprised to see him arrive home on an evening when I was preparing to go to my regular community meeting. I found him in an extremely irritable mood. Heatedly, he took it out on me saying "Where is your God, this Jesus, where is he now"? (Continued on page 7)

Aleppo update - Continued

In his fury, he went on to overturn a table and breaking the religious statue on it. I remained calm. I was so worried for him because he even threatened to kill himself. God gave me grace and I stood patiently absorbing his anger and I hesitated very much before I decided whether I should leave him alone and go to the meeting. After things subsided a bit, I decided to leave to my meeting; there, one of the sisters met me and I told her what had happened. I thank God for her. She listened to my problem and she encouraged me to be patient and to stay calm. Then she surprised me by saying that I should tell my son that he is the "son of the heavenly king". I went home that night and I told my son the sister's words. He was taken back and was completely surprised at my words. I explained things as best as I could, and ended up convincing him, despite his great resistance, to go back to his unit and face his officer and settle matters with him.

An impossible situation redeemed

The next day, my son went back to his unit. His officer was in a positively different mood. He started by asking him about me and my health. He showed interest and wanted to make things right. My son could not believe his ears. As things straightened out between two of them, the officer ended up telling my son "If your mother is all alone, I want to give you another two days to visit her" and allowed him to go back home, this time with his approval.

Nothing is impossible with God

The situation in Aleppo is improving now for nothing is impossible with God.

I continually thank God for the brothers and sisters in Emmanuel, and all the communities in the network of communities across the world that we hear about and are inspired by.

I feel very thankful specially for the community in Lebanon, our neighboring country. They are a great example for us to follow.

Praise God! Come Lord Jesus.

A PREVIEW OF SPIRIT ALIVE EVENTS FOR 2019

2019 will soon be arriving and we want you to get a sneak preview of what Spirit Alive has planned for you to start the year off.

Have you been to Everglade City lately? Although small in comparison to Naples, it is very rich in Collier county history. A fun and lively 2019 beginning at St. John's has been planned by Spirit Alive. We will sponsor a car-pooling trip to Everglade City on Friday, January 25.



What attractions will we check out?

1. The Museum of the Everglades



The Museum of the Everglades First opened in 1927 as a commercial laundry, today's Museum of the Everglades dates back to a time when construction of the famous Tamiami Trail was well underway and the tiny settlement of Everglades served as the first County seat. The museum's permanent and rotating exhibits provide visitors with an in-depth look at over 2,000 years of human history in the area and tell the story of those adventurous enough - and stubborn enough - to settle Southwest Florida's Last frontier.

Faithfully restored to its original, 1920's Collier-era appearance, the museum is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is located 35 miles east of downtown Naples. Admission is free. Donations are appreciated. Local history programs tours and presentations by request.

2. The Smallwood Store



Established in 1906 The Smallwood Store is now a museum open 7 days a week. At the Historic Smallwood Store you will learn the story of the pioneers who tamed this vast wilderness also known as "Florida's Last Frontier". Learn about the Calusa Indians and later the Seminole and Miccousukee Tribes that traded at the Trading Post. Visit the Tigertail gift shop located inside the Smallwood Store Museum. You will find books & DVD's related to Southwest Florida History, authentic Seminole crafts & carvings, artwork & photography from local artist, alligator heads, t-shirts and much more.

3. Lunch with us as we discover Old Florida at the Rod & Gun Club in Everglades City



Steve Winston has shared the following on the internet.

There's a place on the Southwest Coast of Florida, deep in the 10,000 Islands area of the Everglades, where it's still the 19th Century. It's called the Rod & Gun Club in Everglades City.

From the outside, the Everglades City Rod & Gun Club looks simply like an old white lodge. But when you open the doors and walk inside, you're suddenly enveloped in a time-warp. The ambience - and all the furniture - is from the turn of the century. In fact, it's actually the original furniture from the days when the Rod & Gun Club was a playground for some of the world's wealthiest people.

In 1972 it was purchased by the Bowen family, who still own it today. They've closed down the top two floors of the main building, kept the bottom floor (with a fine restaurant, great room, Victorian sitting rooms, general store, etc.) as an authentic monument to those grandiose times, and built five cottages with four units each for guests.

The main house is filled with high Victorian chairs with elaborate embroidery. Stuffed otters, deer, alligators, panthers, fish, and assorted other critters on the walls and floors. Elegant crystal chandeliers. Dark hardwood floors. Wooden ceiling fans. Tiffany lamps with stained-glass and fringed shades. Nautical antiques. Wooden roll-top desks.

It is an honor to be considered for a position on the St. John's Vestry.




MARY TILNEY



Women's Advent Study

Throughout the Bible, God promises The Advent or coming of his son, Jesus. This is one of the most important events in all of human history — the almighty, eternal, creator of the universe becoming human, living among us, and suffering on our behalf in order to give us life.

The Old Testament looks expectantly for The Advent of God's forever king, the anointed one who would bring peace to his people. Isaiah 9:6 declares, "For a child will be born to us, a son will be given to us; And the government will rest on His shoulders; And his name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace."

The New Testament exclaims of Christ's coming. In Luke 2:8-11, when the long-awaited Messiah finally arrives, angels announce his birth by declaring, "I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to all people.  - In the Bible people who have hope are very different from optimists! God's character alone is the basis for trusting that the future will be better than the present.
- December 10th Chara/Joy
 - God's people are called to a unique type of joy. It's more than a happy mood, but rather a choice to trust that God will fulfill his promises.
- December 17th Agape/Love
 - Jesus defines "love" by his example: seeking the well-being of others regardless of their response. This Christmas re-experience the power of Christ's overwhelming love.

Feel free to participate in one or all of the sessions as you prepare for the King of Shalom to be born anew into your heart and your life this Christmas, bringing his peace, hope, joy and love!





A DISCUSSION OF ANGELS AFTER READING BILLY GRAHAM'S BOOK, 'ANGELS'
