

St. John's has graciously opened the Prayer Room for appointments for people seeking healing prayer through Christian Healing Center of Naples (CHC). CHC prayer ministers are activated through Holy Spirit with "gifts of

healing" to pray with people (See 1 Corinthians 12). Training for prayer ministers is continuous in the sources available through International Order of St. Luke the Physician and other organizations such as Christian Healing Ministries (Francis and Judith MacNutt). St. John's provides a safe place for people wanting healing prayer. CHC comes under the authority of Fr. Joe (also a member of the CHC Board of Directors) whenever meeting with people at St. John's. You can make an appointment for yourself, family member, or friend by calling 239 315 4630.

CHC offers appointments at St. John's Monday and Friday between 10am and 4pm and other times as the prayer room and prayer ministers are available. House calls and prayers by telephone are also available. There is no charge.

Christian Healing Center of Naples, Inc. is a 501 c3 Not-for-Profit service offering healing prayer and a safe place for people to gather to meet Jesus. Free will gifts are accepted.





You still have your home; you can look outside and see green grass on your lawn. You still have all of your personal belongings, your family, your pets and friends. You start your day with your first cup of coffee and breakfast. You plan your day. It could be going to work, spending time with family and friends, going shopping or possible getting ready to play a round of golf. You could be volunteering at the St. John's Thrift Shoppe or getting ready to go to St. John's Episcopal Church service. After reading the above take a moment to count your blessings, I do every day. I thank the Lord for my blessings.

One of our cashiers at St. John's Thrift Shoppe counted his blessings and took on the task to help the people in the Bahamas. The board would like to thank <u>Joe Locricchio and his wife Trudy</u> for taking on the task of putting together eight large bags of clothing and taking them to the drop-off area to be delivered to the people in the Bahamas.

When we receive clothing at the shoppe, all items are inspected to ensure that they are suitable to be placed on the floor for sale. Items that are damaged or if clothing has stains need repair are placed in a bin to picked up by a company that delivers to very needy people in other areas.

Joe and Trudy took it upon themselves to inspect the discarded clothing in the bin along with items that do not sell at the shoppe and when finished had eight large bags. They did this on behalf of the shoppe. Joe and Trudy counted their blessings and realized that those people do not wake up to a home, family, friends, pets, food, clothing and essential things needed for day to day living any longer.



40 Days of LOVE


Purpose of the Initiative

"Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not high minded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy;

Growing up as a child, my family had so very little.

I had just one pair of shoes. They were plastic and every time the back would break, my grandmother would sew it back up.

Even though we didn't have much, I was happy.

When you're poor as a child, you don't know what poor is. You know you have a roof over your head, you have clothes, and you have love. That was the most important thing.

My grandmother would always hug me and tell me stories. She did her best to see that we always had something to eat. At times, it was minimal. Sometimes, we didn't have anything at all.

At the end of every day, Grandmother would go to the market and beg for the bits and pieces that had not sold. She'd bring home whatever of the day's leavings she could get and make a meal out of it.

At home with Grandmother, I felt safe, but I still remember what it's like to go to school or out in the community and have people look at you as if you don't belong because you don't have what others have. I grew up with that but, because I knew I was loved, a lot of times what others thought did not matter to me.

Although I am no longer poor, I know what it's like to be without, and that's a gift from God with a divine purpose. Remembering that, I want to help others.

In deep humility and with great gratitude, I give thanks for all that God has given my husband and me through the years. We have been richly blessed so that we are able to richly bless others, all for the glory of God.

Lessons in Reconciliation

This summer a small group of us looked closely at the stories of Joseph and his family; their oft-broken relationships and their reconciliations. I thought you might be interested in some of our takeaways, grouped by some of the root causes of conflicts.

FEAR:

Abraham, fearing for his life, lied twice that Sarah was not his wife -- but his sister. God stepped in both times protecting Pharaoh and then King Abimelech from committing adultery. <u>Reconciliation involved God's intervention, candid confrontation, non-aggression pacts, and geographic separation.</u>

Jacob facing Esau's death threats over his theft of the Abrahamic blessing, fled him to his uncle Laban. Years later, in route back home, Jacob sent messengers ahead to Esau hoping for a friendly reception. But learning that Esau was coming with an army of 400 men to meet him, Jacob, in terror, prayed earnestly for God's protection, sent generous gifts, bowed low, and introduced his wives and children. The brothers parted on good terms and later came together to bury Isaac. Reconciliation involved taking the initiative, reaching out, praying earnestly, giving generously, embracing Esau into the family.

Returning to Egypt following Jacob's funeral, Joseph's half-brothers were terrified that he would exact vengeance on them for having sold him into slavery. But Joseph reassured them that they had nothing to fear, that God had used that tragic event to save Israel from starvation, and that he would take care of them. <u>Reconciliation involved loving forgiveness, reassurances and promises of provision.</u>

IMPATIENCE:

Abraham and Sarah, impatient for the promised son and heir, arranged for Hagar to give birth to Ishmael which led to a family break-up. Reconciliation involved God directly reassuring Abraham, providing for Hagar and promising her that her son would also have nations of descendants.

Rebekah impatient for her favorite son to receive the promised blessing, tricked Isaac into blessing Jacob instead of his older twin Esau. <u>Reconciliation involved God wrestling with Jacob and blessing him as worthy of the name Israel and sending him on his way home to Isaac.</u>

BROKEN PROMISES:

Laban's substitution of Leah for Rachel whom he had promised to Jacob in return for 7 years of labor undermined trust between uncle and son-in-law. Reconciliation began when Laban consented to Jacob marrying Rachel too, provided he worked 7 more years. Later Laban agree to Jacob's plan for differentiating their respectful flocks. When Jacob packed up his family and flocks and left Laban without saying goodbye, Laban tracked them down and berated Jacob for making off with his daughters and grandchildren. Reconciliation occurred when Jacob laid out an honest account of all the ways Laban had mistreated him over the years, invited Laban to share a meal. Laban professed his love for Jacob's family and blessed them all before returning home.

Jacob was furious with Simeon and Levi for slaughtering the men of Shechem after they had submitted to circumcision in expectation of intermarriage and shared wealth. <u>Reconciliation followed Jacob's harsh dressing down for bringing humiliating dishonor on the family. Despite their lack of remorse, Jacob never disowned them. With God's protection Jacob moved the entire family away from Shechem to Bethel where Isaac was waiting.</u>

JEALOUSY:

Rachel and Leah were locked in a competition for Jacob's love, which played out in a race to provide Jacob with sons, directly or indirectly through concubines. God granted Leah 6 sons to compensate for Jacob's true love for Rachel. <u>Reconciliation between the sisters became possible after God assuaged Rachel's longing by giving her 2 sons: Joseph and Benjamin.</u>

Joseph's half-brothers were very jealous of Joseph because he was Jacob's favorite, he reported their misdeeds to Jacob, and he shared his dreams that were interpreted as foretelling his ruling over them. They sold Joseph to traders and lied to Jacob that Joseph had been devoured by a wild animal. Reconciliation began as God was with Joseph throughout his meteoric career rise in Egypt -- giving him the power to interpret dreams and bringing his brothers to Egypt to buy food. After testing the brothers' sincerity and remorse, Joseph forgave them, wept over them, gave them generous gifts—including the land of Goshen for relocation—and blessed them.
