We remember that Jesus was born in a manger, and walked as a humble suffering Savior.

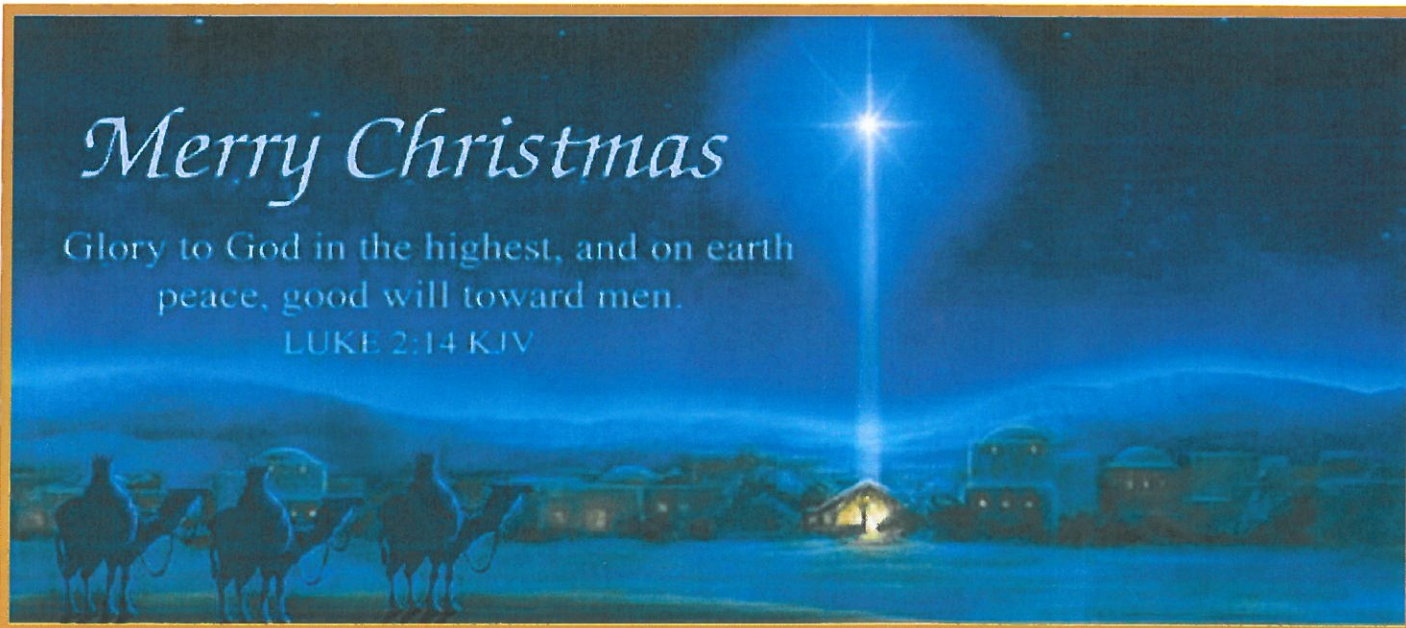
Lord, help us to share the love of God with everyone we encounter, to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and stand against injustice and oppression.

We rejoice today with the best gifts of hope, peace, joy and the love of God in Jesus Christ. Amen.

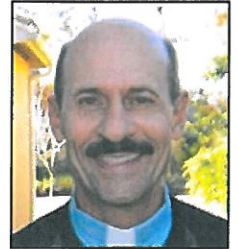

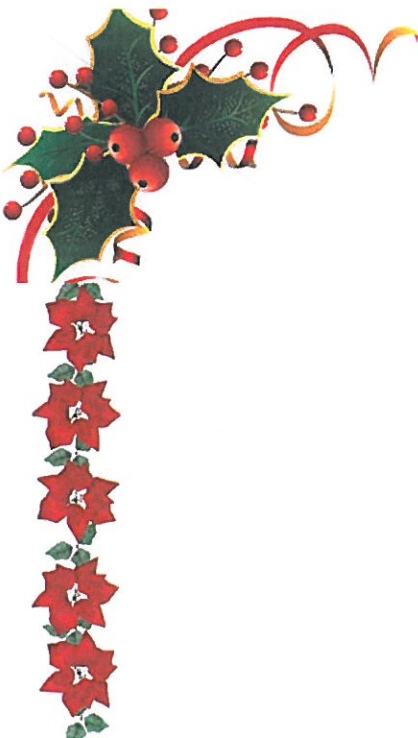
Rick took a survey of Christmas shoppers and asked, "What are you celebrating this Christmas?" The answers were...

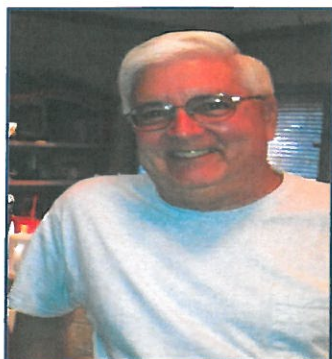

JIM ETZ

I was born in Chicago but moved to Mexico City when I was 8. After moving back to the US, I attended St. John's Military Academy, an Episcopal Military school, in Delafield, Wisc. I graduated from Ole Miss in 1966 with a degree in Marketing. That is where I met my wife Betsy. We married in 1966 and have three sons, one daughter, and eight grandchildren.

My work experience includes seven years at Sears; five of them at the Sears Headquarters in Chicago. After leaving Sears I went into the car business and owned a General Motors dealership, Chevrolet, Pontiac & Buick, in Missouri for 10 years; and a Chrysler Plymouth, Dodge dealership for the last three years of those years. Following that we moved to Collierville, TN, a suburb of Memphis, where we owned and operated two McDonald's Restaurants.

2019 Vestry Retreat & 2020 Goals



On October 26, the Vestry met to review where we are and where we want to go. Using a process called Mutual Ministry Review, we assessed how we're doing and what we see as opportunities to advance our strategic mission to: Embrace God; Love Your Neighbor; and Serve the World.

Reflecting back on our 2019 goals, we saw significant improvements in our website, especially the addition of live streaming and inspiring personal testimonies. We extended the lease for our St. John's Thrift Shoppe and enabled record donations for storm relief through matching grants to Matthew 25 ministries. We grew our healing ministries in partnership with the Christian Healing Center, Life Relaunch, and other spiritual healers nationally and internationally. We also saw real growth in our children's ministry with a rise in Sunday School attendance, the hiring of a part-time children and youth director (Dayna Sottosanti), and a regular cadre of parents excited to teach preschoolers and elementary school children.

And so, after a robust discussion, we developed the following goals for 2020:

ST. JOHN'S MMR GOALS FOR 2020

St. John's is a catholic, charismatic, evangelical church led by the Holy Spirit. We lead ecumenically in healing ministries, Biblical teaching, community outreach and Christian partnerships. Our charitable donations greatly exceed expectations for a church our size.

EMBRACING GOD – SERVING THE CHURCH

GOAL: Personally, invite more parishioners to give time and talent to lay ministries, and specifically develop a larger pool of trained ushers, lay readers, acolytes.

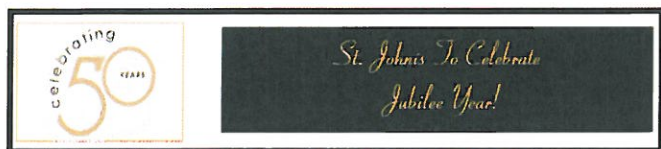
LOVING OUR NEIGHBORS—SERVING OUR PARISH FAMILY

GOAL: Re-awaken in our retired parishioners the desire to grow spiritually and to continue to engage with others in ministries so as to improve their quality of life.

GOAL: Formally prepare our youth for their first communion, for engaging in a wide range of ministries, and for bonding with other Christian teens.

SERVING THE WORLD—SERVING THE NAPLES COMMUNITY AND BEYOND

GOAL: Deepen relationships with affiliated partners locally and internationally: Thrift Shoppe Partners, Life Relaunch, Christian Healing Center, Matthew 25 Ministries and missionaries in the Middle East and India.



ST JOHNS CLERGY OVER 50 YEARS

St Johns has had five vicars/rectors and nine assistant rectors, plus a goodly number of retired priests who assisted in a variety of roles. The mission that became St Johns in 1970 was served by Rev Tom Moss, Vicar, until retiring in 1976. He was succeeded by Rev Charles Day who was named the parish's first rector before he resigned in 1980. Rev James Schulthess came as rector in 1981 and stayed for 10 years. He was succeeded by St Johns longest serving rector – 1982 to 2006 – Rev William O'Connell. His retirement led to the calling of Rev Joseph Maiocco, our present rector.

Four of our nine assistant rectors were ordained at St Johns. Rev Alfred S. Lee, who was the first (1979 to 1984), however was a retired priest who originally volunteered to help when Fr Day left, and stayed on! John Stonesifer was ordained at St Johns in 1984 and left two years later when called to be rector of St Peter's Church, Salisbury, MD. Rev Leigh Halliwell was assistant from 1986 to 1987, followed by Rev John Mitchell who was called in 1988 to St Luke's, Farmingham, ME. Rev Ildefonso "Frank" Cabrera joined St Johns in 1987 and led a four year effort to begin a Spanish speaking ministry here and in Immokalee. Michael Durning was ordained here in 1988, serving til 1992 when he was called as rector of St Mark's, Marco before being appointed Canon to the Ordinary of our Diocese. In 1998, Charles Mann was ordained here and served til 2004 when he was called as rector of Nativity Church, Sarasota. Nicholas Funk was ordained in St Johns in 2005 and was assistant until called a year later to St Alban's, St Petersburg Beach. Rev Christian Maxfield came in 2015 and was called in 2018 as rector of All Souls Church, North Ft Myers.

TREASURER'S NOTES



I recently received a reminder from one of my favorite institutions for charitable giving, reminding me of the opportunity to use a portion of my IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) to make a "tax-smart" gift from this year's distribution,

or perhaps next year's distribution. When a contribution is made from your IRA, directly to the charitable institution (e.g. St John's Episcopal Church), you do not pay taxes on that portion of the income RMD distribution. In their words, "this means your IRA qualified charitable distribution gift is tax-free!"

To qualify

- You must be 70 ½ years old, or older, at the time of the gift.
- Your gift must go directly from your IRA to the qualified charity, like St John's.
- Gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per taxpayer.
- Gifts must be completed before December 31, 2019 to take advantage of these benefits in the current tax year. By example, you may prepay your 2020 pledge before the end of 2019 if you choose.

Consult your IRA administrator for a form to initiate a "Qualified Charitable Distribution." You may also choose to consult with your accountant or person who prepares your tax returns for further advice.

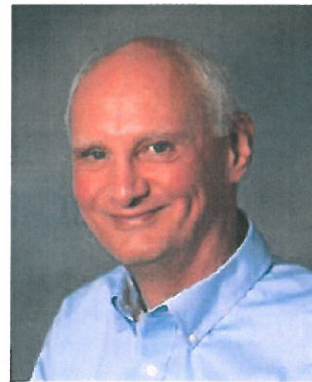

Report on Emmanuel – Aleppo

September – October 2019

As told by the team from the People of God Lebanon

*Dear Pastor Joe and the faithful at St John's church in Naples FL
May the peace of Christ be with you,*

Our last report sent to your church offices, spoke about testimonies by two Aleppo resident Christian workers who spoke about the challenges and the tremendous opportunities currently present in their city.

This present report receives the testimony of one who very recently helped lead a retreat held for Emmanuel in a Syrian city close to the border with Lebanon and overlooking the Mediterranean Sea.

It is a scenic place where summertime vacationers come and which sadly now, has become a place where refugees have flocked for the past eight years.

As one travels the beautiful countryside in the area, one cannot but notice the billboards dotting the roadside and representing so many young men who have died for country.

The retreat was attended by fresh additions to Emmanuel as well as some old hands who helped with the retreat. It started with unmistakable joy and enthusiasm. Mutual care, encouragement and consolation were flowing both ways among the Lebanese and the brethren from Aleppo. Both groups had arrived by bus around the same time, and soon the anticipation of hearing the Lord and His call was the beginning of what turned out to be a great time together.

Despite the great challenges facing them, Emmanuel members always express how they constantly live in the joy of the Lord and His goodness. The Lord's presence felt so strong, uplifting and invigorating. Everyone left the retreat knowing that his and her efforts at being there were so well worth it and exceeding all expectations. Having the Lebanese with them meant a lot to the Emmanuel members.

New Freedom and boldness

Around fifty-five people (mostly young) were attending the retreat for the first time. Forty-five Emmanuel members were also present. The turnout would have been even greater (as high as one hundred fifty just from Aleppo) had the retreat been scheduled a month earlier when schools and universities were still on summer recess. This is clear evidence to the great hunger for vision and the desire for spiritual inspiration currently present, among the Christian population in Aleppo.

The mixed age groups' blend was wonderful to see and included a large number of young couples who have chosen to stay in Aleppo for the sake of being in Emmanuel despite the massive pressure put on them by loved ones to leave.

Emmanuel has quickly and beautifully grown, to fully grasp what it means to be renewed in the Holy Spirit, living in God's presence, and using the time to enjoy long prayer times and rest in God's healing presence. Everyone at the retreat was blessed with a fiery zeal and desire to follow the Lord and witness for the gospel, in a new and bolder manner.

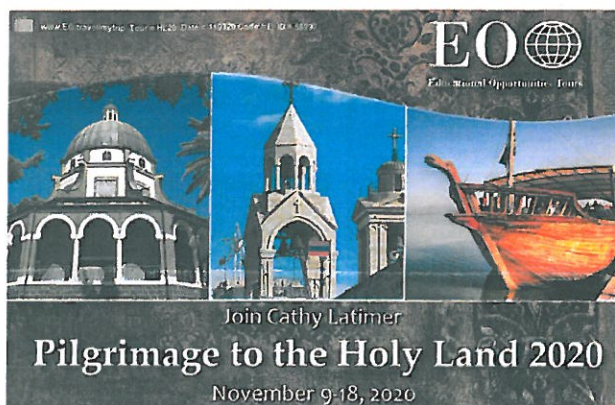
This year, unlike previous ones, instead of using the time for teaching around a particular theme in a conference format, the time was used mainly to seek the Lord for His word and personal direction. Jean Barbara, President of the Sword of The Spirit gave three talks based on Apostle Paul's letters' teachings and focusing on how to respond and yield to the workings of the Holy Spirit. One talk was about "Conversation with God", the second on "Faithfulness" and the third on "Come to me you all who are heavy laden and I will give you rest".

An extraordinary time of ministry followed and a great many number of people came forward asking to be prayed with for a greater release of the Holy Spirit in their lives.

At the end of the retreat, several people shared some remarkable testimonies. More than one person shared how despite a great desire to use spiritual gifts (yielding to prophecy, praying for healing and in tongues) and despite the great skepticism surrounding the area in Aleppo, came forward and witnessed that they have started using those gifts and could not stop praying in tongues with renewed conviction and faith.

Other powerful testimonies, included more than a few of the members who shared that they came to the retreat, having lost their enthusiasm and faith to continue, yet the Lord visited them powerfully and they came out having renewed their decision to live for the Lord and offer themselves to Him completely.

Emmanuel asks that you continue to pray for continued growth and the ability to be formed into the body and people that the Lord has called them to be. May the Lord of the harvest send many to work in His field in Aleppo, for indeed, the "laborers are few". Many thanks to St John's Church in Naples, FL. for your prayers and continued support. We are inspired by your faithfulness and great generosity. We could not do what we are doing in Aleppo without you!

Please enjoy Chapter 14 from 'The Hope that is in Us'

THE LORD IS MY SAVIOR

"...we have fixed our hope on the living God, who is the Savior of all..."

1 Timothy 4:10 (ESV)

We may say those words many times as we seek to live Christian lives, but until we experience Christ in action, understanding His saving grace remains purely hypothetical. Only when we experience Him as our personal savior does the mystery of faith become steadfast in our lives.

When I was a young teenager, the neighborhood I lived in grew to be less safe. The city had hit hard economic times and houses were boarded up. Muggings became a growing concern in the once peaceful neighborhood.

I was walking home alone from my girlfriend's house which was a couple of blocks away. A group of young men across the street started to make inappropriate racial comments about me. I was acutely aware of the uncomfortable situation that might occur. Moving ahead with determination, I prayed for the Lord to help me.

Out of nowhere, a boy from my class appeared by my side. The trash talk stopped from the group. He stayed with me until I was safely home. That was the first time I was frightened in my neighborhood and was so grateful when this person, a boy I barely knew, came to help me.

Years later, my husband became critically ill.

All the medical advancements in the world were not going to cure him. However, through faith and guidance from my pastor, I learned to give the heartache to God. I prayed every day for God to see me through the ordeal of caregiving as my husband grew weaker and spoke less and less.

When the time came for him to die, my husband emerged from his silence and sang *Amazing Grace* two times before making his departure. I truly believe an angel of mercy took him to the Lord.

The same day I had a heart attack and, through circumstances guided by the hand of God, I was rushed to the hospital and had surgery. I joke that God didn't want me that day—but I was ready to go, for my life as I knew it was over.

Several weeks later, during a grief-stricken moment, I ran a red light and missed a car by inches. Once through the intersection, I pulled to the side of the road and cried. God saved me once again. There is a reason I am alive: I have a purpose in living now with Christ by my side.

The Lord is indeed my Savior...

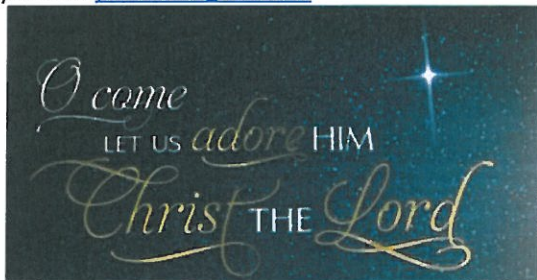

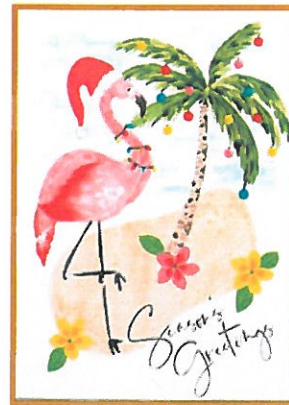
